NORTH SIDE UPDATE

Started with twenty students - Today ninety-three

It has been almost two years since Summit expanded to serve students on the North Side of Milwaukee and eight months since moving to its present facilities at the Martin Luther King Park on 15th and Vliet. The program began with 10 students and 10 tutors on two nights a week at Dineen Park (70th and Capitol) and this year there are ninety-three students participating on the north side. The summer program has grown from 70 to 150 students.



It is a bit early to judge any academic progress of the new north side students; however, there are many anecdotes. Before attending Summit one student was expelled from two different schools for problems with hostile attitudes and actions. He hated reading as well. His father reports that since beginning at Summit, he has been at the same school, his anger issues have disappeared, and he now enjoys reading.

One mother reported that upon returning to school after Summit summer program, her daughter's teacher asked her what she did to improve her math skills because they were above the other students in her class.



Several local companies are stepping forward to partner with Summit in helping form our high school students. Summit students participate in a fully racially integrated program and any prejudices are broken down at a young age. The King and Kosciuszko centers are located only eight minutes apart by car, so the boys from the south side travel north to King and girls from the north side travel south to Kozy. They love their friends and facilities on the opposite side of downtown and parents love the convenience of having the centers so close by.



TUTOR SPOTLIGHT

Marquette and UWM Service Learning Programs are a Key to Summit's Success



Kids think Griffin Rain is cool because he is a great athlete, he makes learning fun, and he has tutored for 2 years so everyone knows him. He is a senior majoring in Business at MU from Florida and says, "I like Summit's approach of combining virtue talks, academics and sports. Specifically, I love the character development aspect where I get to help my student set goals. I, myself, I am a believer of goal setting because it helps me define where I am going". Griffin ran track in high school and his freshman year at Marquette and started Pedal Power Cabs in his spare time. He now owns a fleet of 10 bicycle cabs in downtown Milwaukee and continues to grow his business. He spends much of his other spare time with youth clubs at churches and is trying to focus on what God might be calling him to after college.



The term "Cool" referring to a person can mean different things to grade students but all have three undeniable common factors which are energy, friendship and reliability. We are grateful for Marquette University and UW Milwaukee for providing "Cool" tutors who volunteer at Summit. Through their service learning programs, Marquette University and UWM provided 89 tutors for the Fall 2019. Many continue tutoring after their required semester of service is complete, which makes them super "Cool".



Megan Neuman is a UWM Nursing Student (2020) who has been tutoring Jereni since the spring of 2018. Now in 6th grade, Jereni's let Megan know she was struggling with math so Megan focused most of their time together on that subject. Megan says "I have seen an improvement in her math skills and I think she is more comfortable working on math problems. Time as flown by and I'm glad to have the opportunity to see her become the bright student that she is." Megan accepted a position at the medical intensive care unit at Froedtert Hospital and looks forward to a career in the critical care setting, as well as tutoring Jereni.
